

Effects of Heroin

Heroin is an illegal, highly addictive drug processed from morphine, a naturally occurring substance extracted from the seed pod of certain varieties of poppy plants.

High purity heroin is commonly ingested through snorting or smoking and may be more appealing to new users because it eliminates the stigma associated with injection drug use. Impure heroin, also known as 'black tar heroin', is usually dissolved, diluted, and injected into veins, muscles, or under the skin.
